The first section of the newsletter features Pragathi's efforts to support Mr Vamsidhar Kalidasu and his nonprofit organization, **Children of The Forest** (COF). A math teacher by profession, he now works full time with passion to support Chenchu tribal communities in 50 interior forest habitations, cut off from rest of the world. Of the 32 tribes in AP and Telangana, these aboriginal tribals are the most underprivileged, living their lives in extreme conditions.

- They live in small hamlets with population of few hundreds •
- Literacy is nil they are unaware of value of education •
- They collect gum, honey and other forest produce
- Income is for 100 days a year through MNREGA government scheme •
- They depend on hunting and gathering for food •
- There is remarkable unity amongst them •

Dr Divesh Anireddy, a gastro-enterologist in the USA, doing tremendous humanitarian work has been sharing lot of ideas in the field of education, employment and health care. We have collaborated and implemented several projects successfully in last three years. We are encouraged by the involvement of nonprofit organizations, the **Telangana Development Forum, USA (TDF)** and Swastava Cancer Care. Below, we showcase some of the projects implemented successfully, after countless hours of diligent planning.

Providing Livelihood to Fifteen Rural Women - Computerized Embroidery Machine

As part of women empowerment program, to help 15 rural poor women with gainful employment, a computerized embroidery machine was purchased. The inauguration ceremony was on March 3, 2023 in Lingampally village. The village women, filled with joy, thanked Pragathi and TDF for providing the machine.

The program is going very well. Ten ladies have learned to use this machine, four out of them have done advance training. Others are still learning to use the machine. Pragathi team thanks Dr Anireddy for all the support and guidance.

Support the Poor Farmers in Twenty Five Villages - Jai Kisan Project

Sixty Five to Seventy percent of the population in India lives in rural areas. The Jai Kisan project was started by **Telangana Development Forum** (TDF) in 2015. Pragathi team is excited to be a partner in Jaikisan Project in Telangana and to support the needy poor farmers. As a pilot project, we will team up with local farmers in 25 villages who are already doing natural farming work, and with support from local agriculture officers help these farmers with natural farming. A great opportunity for the Pragathi team to learn more about good practices in agriculture. The program will be expanded to Burgula and other areas in Telangana state eventually. Some of the objectives and plans of the projects are as follows:

- a. Promote natural farming among the poor rural farmers and improve their income.
- b. Help revive and rejuvenate contaminated soils.
- c. Help with high yield crop and safe practices.
- d. Improve health leading to prevention of diabetes mellitus, hypertension and cancers at a younger age.
- e. Helping farmers market the produce at good prices.
- f. Support farmers to start growing organic food for their households and eat healthy organic foods.
- g. Providing farmers organic seeds and agricultural tools.

Mobile Medical Van For Cancer Prevention and Screening in Telangana State

Swastava Cancer Care expresses hearty and sincere thanks to Pragathi and Telangana Development Forum for making available a 14 seater Force van to increase cancer awareness and screening in Rural Telangana . The Van is commissioned and running , giving enough publicity to create awareness, screening & early detection. The goal is to eradicate cervical cancer in Telangana. Swastava is looking forward to working with Pragathi during 2023-24 on cancer awareness, school health programme and vaccinating girls in the age group of 9 to 14 with HPV vaccine as soon as it is released commercially by Serum Institute of India.

Chenchu children walk 307 km to explore life beyond their 'pentas'

Hyderabad: Venturing out of the Nallamalla forests. Chenchu tribal children walked 307 km in a marathon relay walk, wearing a sport jersey and sports shoes, as they explored a different world other than their interior 'pentas' (habita-tions).

tions). Twentyone children in the age group of 8-13 also had a me-morable meeting with Vice President M Venkaiah Naidu in Nellore in Andhra Pradesh.
